

The Hythe Primary School and Runnymede Family Centre Uniform Policy

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Date of next review: April 2024



It is our school policy that all children wear school uniform when attending school, representing the school, or when participating in a school-organised event outside normal school hours. We believe that that school uniform promotes a sense of pride in the school and engenders a sense of community and belonging towards the school.

Following consultation with Governors and parents, the Hythe school uniform consists of:

We regard suitable footwear to be part of our school uniform. Fashion shoes, especially those with heels, and trainers are not suitable for school use.

Jewellery in School

Children are not allowed to wear jewellery in school, except recognised religious jewellery. This includes rings, bracelets and necklaces. Only stud earrings are permitted and children should be able to remove these themselves for PE to comply with Surrey County Council's health and safety regulations. Children should only wear a watch if they can tell the time and then they wear it at their own risk. This is a reasonable request as it is made to ensure the safety of all our children and the security of their belongings.

The role of Parents

We ask all parents who send their children to our school to support the school uniform policy by ensuring their child has the correct uniform, and that it is clean and in good repair.
